- Examining library funding is always a good idea challenges are always on the horizon for libraries.
- Analysing, reviewing, and consolidating funding sources into a sustainable levy is a best practice for library boards.
- The recommendation for Library Districts is to receive 90% or more funding from a public referendum.
- Senate Bill S7857A: Directs the commissioner of taxation and finance to study and to make recommendations regarding the frequency of residents who are being assessed library taxes for more than one library A.K.A. a study on double taxation.
- Addressing unserved areas can shed light on potential funding opportunities.

- → New Governor equals new opportunities
- → Reducing double taxed areas
- → Serving the underserved or unserved
- → Building service areas that make sense

Pathways Forward: School District or Joint School District Model

- → Case study of attempt in Southern Tier Library System Arkport/Canaseraga
- → One association library and one reading center explored joint model
- → Library system spearheaded comprehensive study defining "new library"
- → Boards met multiple times to consider and discuss
- → Didn't move forward, but boards were open to it and understood value
- → A new school district public library was created from reading center
- → Groundwork for joint school district public library was established
