COLLABORATIVE PROGRAMMING AT MACEDON LIBRARY

The Macedon Public Library is working with Literacy Volunteers of Wayne County to offer a fun event for families to enjoy. With the help of sponsorships from ALPCO Recycling and the Friends of Macedon Public Library, the library will offer a fun-filled evening of jack-o'-lantern sightings. Up to 50 pumpkins displayed with flickering candle lights will be displayed throughout the library. The pumpkins will be carved by local businesses, nonprofit organizations and individuals. Each is guaranteed to be a unique display of creativity and imagination! All community members wishing to carve a pumpkin will be able to pick one up at the Macedon Public Library beginning on October 4. Pumpkins will be available for pickup while supplies last. On the day of the event, Friday, October 20, participants can choose to vote for their favorite jack-o'lanterns by placing a dollar in the jar of any they really like. Voting is not required, however, voting will help to raise funds for the important programs Literacy Volunteers of Wayne County provides daily for children, teenagers and adults.

In addition to admiring pumpkins, children twelve years of age and under will have an opportunity to listen to a Halloween-themed story read aloud and to receive a trick or treat bag. Children, teens and adults are welcome to wear costumes to the event; however, wearing a costume is optional. In addition to viewing pumpkins, there are new activities planned this year including: watching a pie eating contest, trunk-ortreating organized by Creative Environment Daycare and the Town of Macedon (this will be weather permitting), fall-themed activity stations within the library set up by Boy Scouts of America, Girl Scouts of America and 4-H.
